CORPORATE DISCLOSURE POLICY

1.0 Purpose of this Policy

The board of directors (the “**Board**”) of Blue Moon Metals Inc. (the “**Corporation**”) has adopted this Corporate Disclosure Policy (the “**Policy**”) to ensure that the Corporation’s communications with the investment community, the media and the general public are: (i) timely, factual and accurate; and (ii) broadly disseminated in accordance with all applicable legal and regulatory requirements.

It is fundamental that everyone investing in securities of the Corporation have equal access to information that may affect their investment decisions. All Corporation Personnel (as defined below) are required to make the Chief Financial Officer aware of any changes, facts, circumstances or events that could reasonably be considered to be “material information” in the context of this Policy.

This Policy confirms in writing the Corporation’s disclosure policies and practices. Its goal is to raise awareness of the Corporation’s approach to disclosure among Corporation Personnel (as defined below).

2.0 Application of the Corporate Disclosure Policy

This Policy applies to all directors, officers and employees of the Corporation and its subsidiaries, and those authorized to speak on its behalf (who are collectively referred to as “**Corporation Personnel**”).

This Policy covers disclosures in documents filed with stock exchanges, securities regulators, financial and non-financial disclosure (including management’s discussion and analysis (“**MD&A**”) and written statements made in the Corporation’s annual and quarterly reports), news releases, letters to shareholders, presentations by senior management and information contained on the Corporation’s website and other electronic communications. It extends to oral statements in meetings and telephone conversations with analysts and investors, interviews with the media, as well as speeches, press conferences and conference calls.

3.0 Responsible Person

The Chief Financial Officer will be responsible for all regulatory disclosure requirements and for overseeing the Corporation’s disclosure practices, including:

- (a) developing and implementing this Policy;
- (b) monitoring the effectiveness of and compliance with this Policy;
- (c) educating Corporation Personnel about disclosure issues and this Policy;

- (d) reviewing and authorizing disclosure (including electronic, written and oral disclosure) in advance of its public release; and
- (e) monitoring the Corporation's website.

In discharging his or her duties, the Chief Financial Officer will seek and obtain all such advice from the Corporation's Chief Executive Officer and external legal counsel and auditors as is appropriate from time to time.

4.0 Disclosure Controls and Procedures

The Chief Financial Officer will be responsible for establishing and maintaining disclosure controls and procedures for the Corporation, and designing those disclosure controls and procedures to provide reasonable assurance that:

- (a) material information relating to the Corporation, including its consolidated subsidiaries, is made known to the Chief Financial Officer, particularly during the period in which the annual and interim filings are being prepared; and
- (b) information required to be disclosed by the Corporation in its annual filings, interim filings or other reports filed or submitted by it under securities legislation is recorded, processed, summarized and reported within the time periods specified in securities legislation.

5.0 Authorized Corporation Spokespersons

The authorized spokespersons of the Corporation, being such individuals who are authorized to speak on behalf of the Corporation to the investment community, regulators and the media, are limited to the Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer, Chief Operating Officer and Senior Vice President, Corporate Development. These authorized spokespersons may, from time to time, designate others within the Corporation to speak on behalf of the Corporation as a back-up or to respond to specific inquiries.

All Corporation Personnel should refer all inquiries from analysts, investors and the media to the Corporation's authorized spokespersons. Having a limited number of Corporation spokespersons should help to reduce the risk of:

- (a) unauthorized disclosures;
- (b) inconsistent statements by different people in the Corporation; and
- (c) statements that are inconsistent with the public disclosure record of the Corporation.

More specifically, Corporation Personnel who are not authorized spokespersons must not respond under any circumstances to inquiries from the investment community, the media or others, unless specifically asked to do so by an authorized spokesperson, and shall refer the inquirer to the an official spokesperson.

6.0 Review of Certain Disclosure

The following disclosures must be reviewed in advance of their public release by the Audit Committee and the full Board:

- (a) the Corporation's financial statements, MD&A and annual and interim profit or loss news releases;
- (b) earnings guidance;
- (c) financial outlooks and future-oriented financial information;
- (d) news releases containing financial information based on the Corporation's financial statements before the release of those statements; and
- (e) the contents of all other major disclosure documents, including the Corporation's annual report, quarterly reports to shareholders, annual information form, and management information circular.

Financial results should be publicly released immediately following Audit Committee and Board approval of the MD&A, financial statements and notes.

The Corporation will indicate at the time the information in (c) and (d) above is publicly released that the Audit Committee and Board have reviewed the disclosure.

If feasible, the Corporation will issue its profit or loss news release concurrently with the filing of its quarterly or annual financial statements.

7.0 Disclosure Record

The Chief Executive Officer or his/her authorized designate will maintain a five-year record of all material public information about the Corporation, including continuous disclosure documents, news releases and analysts' reports.

8.0 Material Information

"Material information" is any information relating to the business and affairs of the Corporation that results or would reasonably be expected to result in a significant change in the market price or value of the Corporation's listed securities. Material information consists of both **"material facts"** and **"material changes"** relating to the Corporation. A **"material change"** is: (i) a change in the business, operations or capital of the Corporation that would reasonably be expected to have a significant effect on the market price or value of any of the securities of the Corporation; or (ii) a decision to implement a change referred to in (i) made by the Board or by senior management of the Corporation who believe that confirmation of the decision by the Board is probable. Schedule 1 to this Policy sets out a non-exhaustive list of examples of the types of events or information which may be material.

In making materiality judgments, it is necessary to take into account a number of factors that cannot be captured in a simple bright-line standard or test. These include the nature of the information itself, the volatility of the Corporation's securities and prevailing market conditions. The materiality of a particular event or piece of information may vary between companies according to their size, the nature of their operations and many other factors. An event that is "significant" or "major" for a smaller corporation may not be material to a larger corporation. The Corporation should avoid taking an overly technical approach to determining materiality. Under volatile market conditions, apparently insignificant variances between earnings projections and actual results can have a significant impact on share price once released. For example, information regarding the Corporation's ability to meet consensus earnings published by securities analysts should not be selectively disclosed before general public release.

The Corporation will monitor the market's reaction to information that is publicly disclosed. Ongoing monitoring and assessment of market reaction to different disclosure will be helpful when making materiality judgments in the future. As a guiding principle, if there is any doubt about whether particular information is material, the Corporation will err on the side of materiality and release information publicly.

Timely Disclosure Requirements

The Corporation must publicly disclose all material information immediately by way of a news release. In addition, in respect of any material changes, the Corporation must also file a material change report as soon as practicable, and no later than 10 days after the change occurs.

Announcements of material information should be factual and balanced, neither over-emphasizing favourable news or under-emphasizing unfavourable news. Unfavourable news must be disclosed as promptly and completely as favourable news. News releases should contain sufficient detail to enable the reader to appreciate the true substance and importance of the information so that investors may make informed investment decisions. The Corporation must avoid including unnecessary details, exaggerated reports or promotional commentary.

Confidentiality of Material Changes

Although not commonly done, Canadian securities laws permit the Corporation to confidentially file a material change report (and delay public disclosure of such material change), including when the Corporation is of the reasonable opinion that the disclosure of the material change would be unduly detrimental to the Corporation's interests. For example, immediate disclosure might be unduly detrimental if it interferes with the Corporation's pursuit of a specific objective or strategy, with ongoing negotiations, or with its ability to complete a transaction. A confidential material change report must be so marked and the filing must include written reasons for the report being kept confidential. Within 10 days of filing the confidential report and every 10 days thereafter, the Corporation must advise the securities commissions in writing whether it believes that the report should remain confidential.

Confidentiality of Material Information and Share Activity

As long as there is material non-public information, market activity in the Corporation's securities will be carefully monitored. To the extent there is any unusual market activity, the Corporation shall consider if any rumours, leakages or unintentional selective disclosure has occurred and act in accordance with this Policy. See also "*Handling Rumours*" and "*Unintentional Selective Disclosure*".

9.0 Maintaining Confidentiality

Any Corporation Personnel privy to confidential information is prohibited from communicating that information to anyone else, unless it is necessary to do so in the course of business. Corporation Personnel must make efforts to limit access to confidential information to only those who need to know such confidential information and those recipients need to be advised that the information is to be kept confidential.

Outside parties privy to undisclosed material information concerning the Corporation will be told that they must not divulge this information to anyone else, other than in the necessary course of business, and that they may not trade in the Corporation's securities until the information is publicly disclosed. Those outside parties will confirm their commitment to non-disclosure in the form of a written confidentiality agreement.

To prevent the misuse or inadvertent disclosure of material information, the following procedures should be observed at all times:

- (a) documents and files containing confidential information should be kept in a safe place, with access restricted to individuals who "need to know" that information in the necessary course of business and code names should be used if necessary;
- (b) confidential matters should not be discussed in places where the discussion may be overheard, such as elevators, hallways, restaurants, airplanes or taxis;
- (c) confidential documents should not be read or displayed in public places and should not be discarded where others can retrieve them;
- (d) employees must ensure they maintain the confidentiality of information in their possession outside of the office as well as inside the office;
- (e) transmission of documents by electronic means, such as by fax, email or directly from one computer to another, should be made only where it is reasonable to believe that the transmission can be made and received under secure conditions (including secure wifi access);
- (f) unnecessary copying of confidential documents should be avoided and documents containing confidential information should be promptly removed from conference rooms and work areas after meetings have concluded and extra copies of confidential documents should be shredded or otherwise destroyed; and

- (g) access to confidential electronic data should be restricted through the use of passwords.

Communication by email leaves a physical track of its passage that may be subject to later decryption attempts. Caution should be exercised whenever confidential material information is to be transmitted over the Internet.

10.0 Model for Planned Disclosure of Material Corporate Information

The Corporation will use the following disclosure model when making a planned disclosure of material corporate information, such as a scheduled earnings release:

- (a) issue a news release containing the information (for example, the Corporation's quarterly financial results) through a widely circulated news or wire service;
- (b) provide advance public notice by news release of the date and time of a conference call, if applicable, to discuss the information, the subject matter of the call and the means for accessing it;
- (c) hold the conference call in an open manner, permitting investors and others to listen either by telephone or through Internet webcasting; and
- (d) provide dial-in and/or web replay or make transcripts of the call available for a reasonable period of time after the analyst conference call.

The combination of news release disclosure of the material information and an open and accessible conference call to subsequently discuss the information should help to ensure that the information is disseminated in a manner calculated to effectively reach the marketplace and minimize the risk of an inadvertent selective disclosure during the follow-up call.

11.0 News Releases

Once the Chief Financial Officer determines that a development is material (subject to any Board approvals that may be required), it will authorize the issuance of a news release, unless the Chief Financial Officer determines that such developments must remain confidential for the time being, in which case appropriate confidential filings will be made and control of that material information is instituted. Should a material statement inadvertently be made in a selective forum, the Corporation will immediately issue a news release in order to fully disclose that information.

If the stock exchange upon which shares of the Corporation are listed is open for trading at the time of a proposed announcement (or will open for trading within one hour of such proposed announcement), prior notice of a news release announcing material information must be provided to the market surveillance department to enable a trading halt, if deemed necessary by the stock exchanges. If a news release announcing material information is issued outside of trading hours, market surveillance may be notified before the market opens.

News releases will be disseminated through an approved news wire service that provides simultaneous national distribution. Full-text news releases will be transmitted to all stock exchange members, relevant regulatory bodies, major business wires, national financial media, and the local media in areas where the Corporation has its headquarters and operations.

News releases will be posted on the Corporation's website immediately after confirmation of dissemination over the news wire. The website will include a notice that advises the reader that the information posted was accurate at the time of posting, but may be superseded by subsequent disclosures.

Annual and interim financial results will be publicly released following Board approval of the financial statements.

12.0 Analyst Calls and Industry Conferences

Analyst conference calls and industry conferences are to be held in an open manner, allowing any interested party to listen either by telephone and/or through a webcast. This will help to reduce the risk of selective disclosure.

Corporation officials should meet before an analyst conference call, private analyst meeting or industry conference. Where practical, statements and responses to anticipated questions should be scripted in advance and reviewed by the appropriate people within the Corporation. Scripting will help to identify any material corporate information that may need to be publicly disclosed through a news release.

Detailed records and/or transcripts of any conference call, meeting or industry conference will be kept. These will be reviewed to determine whether any unintentional selective disclosure has occurred. If so, the Corporation will take immediate steps to ensure that a full public announcement is made, including contacting the TSX Venture Exchange and asking that trading be halted pending the issuance of a news release.

13.0 Reviewing Analyst Reports

The Corporation has established a policy for reviewing analyst reports. There is a serious risk of violating the tipping prohibition if the Corporation expresses comfort with or provides guidance on an analyst's report, earnings model or earnings estimates. There is also a risk of selectively disclosing material non-financial information in the course of reviewing an analyst's report.

Upon request, the Corporation may review analysts' draft research reports or financial models for factual accuracy based on publicly disclosed information such as pointing out errors or omissions in the Corporation's public disclosure filings. The Corporation will not confirm, or attempt to influence, an analyst's opinions or conclusions and will not express comfort with the analyst's financial model and earnings estimates. To avoid appearing to endorse an analyst's report or model, the Corporation will provide its comments orally or will attach a disclaimer to written comments to indicate the report was reviewed only for factual accuracy.

14.0 Limits on Distributing Analyst Reports

Analyst reports are proprietary products of the analyst's firm. Distributing or referring to analyst reports, or providing links to them, may be viewed as an endorsement by the Corporation of the reports. For these reasons, the Corporation will not provide analyst reports through any means to persons outside of the Corporation or generally to employees of the Corporation, including posting those reports on its website. Despite the foregoing, the Corporation will distribute analyst reports to its directors and senior officers to monitor the communications of the Corporation and to assist them in understanding how the marketplace values the Corporation and how corporate developments affect the analysis. Analyst reports may also be provided to the Corporation's financial and professional advisors in the necessary course of business. The Corporation may post on its website a complete listing, regardless of the recommendation, of all the investment firms and analysts who provide research coverage on the Corporation. If provided, this list will not include links to the analysts' or any other third party websites or publications.

15.0 Forecasts, Forward-Looking Information and Updates

The Corporation must not disclose forward-looking information unless the Corporation has a reasonable basis for that forward-looking information. Any written disclosure of material forward-looking information must include disclosure that:

- (a) identifies forward-looking information as such;
- (b) cautions users of forward-looking information that actual results may vary from the forward-looking information and identifies material risk factors that could cause actual results to differ materially from the forward-looking information; and
- (c) states the material factors or assumptions used to develop forward-looking information.

If making a public oral statement containing forward-looking information, the person must:

- (a) make a cautionary statement that the oral statement contains forward-looking information;
- (b) state that actual results could differ materially from a conclusion, forecast or projection in the forward-looking information;
- (c) state that certain material factors or assumptions were applied in drawing a conclusion or making a forecast or projection as reflected in the forward-looking information; and
- (d) state that additional information on the above is contained in a readily-available document or in a portion of that document and identify that document or portion of the document.

The Corporation must not disclose future-oriented financial information (“**FOFI**”) or a financial outlook unless the FOFI or financial outlook is based on assumptions that are reasonable in the circumstances. Any such disclosure must:

- (a) be limited to a period for which the information in the FOFI or financial outlook can be reasonably estimated; and
- (b) use the accounting policies the Corporation expects to use to prepare its historical financial statements for the period covered by the FOFI or the financial outlook.

Any written disclosure of FOFI or a financial outlook must include disclosure that:

- (a) states the date management approved the FOFI or financial outlook, if the document containing the FOFI or financial outlook is undated; and
- (b) explains the purpose of the FOFI or financial outlook and cautions readers that the information may not be appropriate for other purposes.

The Corporation must discuss in its MD&A events and circumstances that occurred during the period to which the MD&A relates that are reasonably likely to cause actual results to differ materially from material forward-looking information for a period that is not yet complete that the Corporation previously disclosed to the public, as well as the expected differences.

The Corporation must also disclose and discuss in its MD&A material differences between actual results for the annual or interim period to which the MD&A relates and any FOFI or financial outlook for that period that the Corporation previously disclosed.

If, during the period to which its MD&A relates, the Corporation decides to withdraw previously disclosed material forward-looking information, it must disclose in its MD&A the decision and discuss the events and circumstances that led to that decision, including a discussion of the assumptions underlying the forward-looking information that are no longer valid.

16.0 Private Briefings with Analysts, Institutional Investors and Other Market Professionals

Disclosure in individual or group meetings does not constitute adequate disclosure of information that is considered material non-public information. If the Corporation intends to announce material information at an analyst or shareholder meeting or a press conference or conference call, the announcement must be preceded by a news release.

The Corporation recognizes that meetings with analysts and significant investors are an important element of its investor relations program. The Corporation will meet with analysts and investors individually or in small groups as needed and will initiate contacts or respond to analyst and investor calls in a timely, consistent and accurate fashion in accordance with this Policy. All analysts will receive fair treatment regardless of whether they are recommending buying or selling the Corporation’s securities.

The Corporation has a policy of providing only non-material information and publicly disclosed information to analysts. The Corporation will not disclose significant data, and in particular financial information such as sales and profit figures, to analysts, institutional investors and other market professionals selectively rather than to the market as a whole. Earnings forecasts are in the same category.

The Corporation cannot make material information immaterial simply by breaking the information into seemingly non-material pieces. At the same time, the Corporation is not prohibited from disclosing non-material information to analysts, even if these pieces help the analyst complete a “mosaic” of information that, taken together, is material undisclosed information about the Corporation.

The Corporation will provide the same sort of detailed, non-material information to individual investors or reporters that it has provided to analysts and institutional investors and may post this information on its website. Spokespersons will keep notes of telephone conversations with analysts and investors and if practicable more than one Corporation representative will be present at all individual and group meetings. A debriefing will be held after these meetings and if it is determined that selective disclosure of previously undisclosed material information has occurred, the Corporation will immediately disclose the information broadly via news release.

17.0 Providing Earnings Guidance

The Corporation will try to ensure, through the regular public dissemination of quantitative and qualitative information, that analysts’ estimates are in line with the Corporation’s expectations. The Corporation will not confirm, or attempt to influence, an analyst’s opinions or conclusions and will not express comfort with analysts’ financial models and earnings estimates. If the Corporation has determined that it will be reporting results materially below or above publicly held expectations, it may decide to disclose this information in a news release to enable discussion without risk of selective disclosure.

18.0 Quiet Periods

The Corporation observes a quarterly quiet period, during which no earning guidance or comments with respect to the current quarter’s operations or expected results will be provided to analysts, investors or other market professionals. The quiet period begins 14 days prior to the release of quarterly and annual financial statements and ending after the second clear and full trading day following the quarterly financial results or the annual results being made public.

The Corporation does not need to stop all communications with analysts or investors during the quiet period. However, communications should be limited to responding to inquiries concerning publicly available or non-material information.

During a quiet period, the Corporation will not initiate any meetings or telephone contacts with analysts and investors, but will respond to unsolicited inquiries concerning factual matters. If the Corporation is invited to participate, during a quiet period, in investment meetings or conferences organized by others, the Chief Financial Officer, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer,

as necessary, will determine, on a case-by-case basis, if it is advisable to accept these invitations. If accepted, extreme caution will be exercised to avoid selective disclosure of any material, non-public information.

19.0 Unintentional Selective Disclosures

Securities legislation in Canada does not provide a safe harbour which allows companies to correct an unintentional selective disclosure of material information. If the Corporation makes an unintentional selective disclosure it should take immediate steps to ensure that a full public announcement is made. This includes contacting the TSX Venture Exchange and requesting that trading be halted pending the issuance of a news release. Pending the public release of the material information, the Corporation will also tell those parties who have knowledge of the information that the information is material and that it has not been generally disclosed.

20.0 Electronic Communications

Disclosure on the Corporation's website alone does not constitute adequate disclosure of information that is considered material non-public information. Any disclosures of material information on the website will be preceded by the issuance of a news release.

All continuous disclosure documents will be provided in the investor relations section of the Corporation's website. All information posted, including text and audiovisual material, will show the date the material was issued. Any material changes in information must be updated immediately, following issuance of a news release. The website will include a notice that advises the reader that the information was accurate at the time of posting, but may be superseded by subsequent disclosures.

The Chief Financial Officer or his/her authorized designate is responsible for updating the investor relations section of the Corporation's website and for monitoring all Corporation information placed on the website to ensure that it is accurate, complete, up-to-date and in compliance with relevant securities laws.

The Chief Financial Officer or his/her authorized designate will maintain a log indicating the date that material information is posted and/or removed from the investor relations section of the website. Documents filed with securities regulators will be maintained on the website for a minimum of two years.

The Corporation will use current technology to improve investor access to the Corporation's information. The Corporation will concurrently post to the website all documents that the Corporation files on SEDAR+. The Corporation will also post on the investor relations part of the website all supplemental information that it gives to analysts, institutional investors and other market professionals. This includes data books, fact sheets, slides of investor presentations and other materials distributed at analyst or industry presentations. When Corporation representatives make a presentation at an industry sponsored conference, they should try to have their presentation and "question and answer" session webcast.

21.0 Social Media, Chat Rooms, Bulletin Boards and Email

No one should participate in, host or link to chat rooms, social media or bulletin boards. Employees are prohibited from discussing corporate matters in these forums/platforms unless prior approval obtained from the Chief Executive Officer. This prohibition is intended to protect the Corporation from the liability that could arise from the well-intentioned, but sporadic, efforts of employees to correct rumours or defend the Corporation. Employees should report to the Chief Financial Officer any discussion pertaining to the Corporation which they find on the Internet. Notwithstanding the foregoing, employees may participate in LinkedIn, but only to the extent that all postings or discussions are previously publicly disclosed information.

22.0 Handling Rumours

The Corporation does not comment, affirmatively or negatively, on rumours. This also applies to rumours on the Internet. The Corporation's spokespersons will respond consistently to any rumours, saying "It is our policy not to comment on market rumours or speculation."

The Corporation may be required by the TSX Venture Exchange or the Canadian Investment Regulatory Organization ("CIRO") to make a clarifying statement if a market rumour is causing significant volatility in the Corporation's share trading. If material information has been leaked and appears to be affecting trading activity in the Corporation's securities, the Corporation will take immediate steps to ensure that a full public announcement is made. This includes contacting the TSX Venture Exchange and/or CIRO and asking that trading be halted pending the issuance of a news release.

23.0 Distribution of Information During or in Anticipation of a Public Offering

The dissemination of material information before or during the course of any public offering is generally prohibited and, if made, must be carefully coordinated so that it cannot be viewed as "preparing" the market. Care must also be taken to ensure that any information that is released during that period is consistent with the Corporation's offering documents. The Chief Financial Officer, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer, with the guidance of external legal counsel, if necessary, will co-ordinate the Corporation's disclosure during any such period.

24.0 Communication and Enforcement

This Policy applies to all Corporation Personnel. New Corporation Personnel will be provided with a copy of this Policy and educated about its importance. This Policy will be posted on the Corporation's internal website and changes will be communicated to all employees.

Any employee who violates this Policy may face disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment with the Corporation without notice. The violation of this Policy may also violate certain securities laws, which could expose Corporation Personnel to personal liability. If it appears that an employee may have violated those securities laws, the Corporation may refer the matter to the appropriate regulatory authorities, which could lead to fines or other penalties.

25.0 Related Policies

Please see the Insider Trading Policy for additional prohibitions relating to trades in the Corporation's securities, a copy of which may be obtained from the Corporate Secretary.

Changes in Corporate Structure

- changes in share ownership that may affect control of the Corporation
- major reorganizations, amalgamations, or mergers
- take-over bids, issuer bids, or insider bids

Changes in Capital Structure

- the public or private sale of additional securities
- planned repurchases or redemptions of securities
- planned splits of common shares or offerings of warrants or rights to buy shares
- any share consolidation, share exchange, or stock dividend
- changes in the Corporation's dividend payments or policies
- the possible initiation of a proxy fight
- material modifications to rights of security holders

Changes in Financial Results

- a significant increase or decrease in near-term earnings prospects
- unexpected changes in the financial results for any periods
- shifts in financial circumstances, such as cash flow reductions, major asset write-offs or write downs
- changes in the value or composition of the Corporation's assets
- any material change in the Corporation's accounting policy

Changes in Business and Operations

- any development that affects the Corporation's resources, technology, products or markets
- a significant change in capital investment plans or corporate objectives
- major labour disputes or disputes with major contractors or suppliers
- significant new contracts, products, patents, or services or significant losses of contracts or business

- changes to the Board or executive management, including the departure of the Corporation's Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer, Chief Operating Officer or president (or persons in equivalent positions)
- the commencement of, or developments in, material legal proceedings or regulatory matters
- waivers of corporate ethics and conduct rules for officers, directors, and other key employees
- any notice that reliance on a prior audit is no longer permissible
- de-listing of the Corporation's securities or their movement from one quotation system or exchange to another

Acquisitions and Dispositions

- significant acquisitions or dispositions of assets, property or joint venture interests
- acquisitions of other companies, including a take-over bid for, or merger with, another corporation

Changes in Credit Arrangements

- the borrowing or lending of a significant amount of money
- any mortgaging or encumbering of the Corporation's assets
- defaults under debt obligations, agreements to restructure debt, or planned enforcement procedures by a bank or any other creditors
- changes in rating agency decisions
- significant new credit arrangements
